Two longtime staff members of the American Psychological Association (APA) recently left bequests to the American Psychological Foundation (APF). **Jeanie Kelleher**, who works in the APA Public Interest Directorate as the Special Projects Associate, and **Ruth Seitler**, Manager of APA Books Publications and Operations, became the first APA staffers to join the Foundation's Legacy Club.

Jeanie Kelleher and her husband had drafted their will in 1980 when they were first married. After the deaths of their parents, they began toying with the idea of revising their will. Psychology played a major role in Jeanie's life, and she often wondered how she, as a non-psychologist, could contribute something to the field. "I was impressed with the work of APF and admired Dorothy Cantor's leadership," Jeanie has said. "The outcome was simple... make a bequest and know that somewhere down the road I will play a small part in advancing psychology and its impact on the human condition. I encourage others to make the same consideration."

Ruth Seitler and her husband, Jerry Seitler, remembered APF in their estate plans for similar reasons. Ruth has enjoyed working at APA and wanted to do more to contribute to psychology. "The APA has been a top notch employer," Ruth has said. "APA has provided training and advancement opportunities for all staff members, and the work done by APA's network of psychologists during and after a crisis is of vital importance."

APF Funds Research on Childhood Injuries

Robin L. Toblin, the 2006 recipient of the Lizette Peterson Homer Memorial Injury Research Grant, is a fifth year Ph.D./MPH candidate in clinical psychology and public health at the University

of Southern California. The \$1,500 award is given to a researcher whose proposal best reflects a focus on psychosocial research on injuries to children and young adults through accidents, violence, abuse, or suicide.

While studying children's peer relations and bullying at USC, a seminar on youth violence introduced Toblin to violence as a public health issue. She added an MPH to her course of study and spent two summers at the National Institutes of Health studying childhood injuries. For her qualifying exam, she wrote a literature review on the link between childhood aggression and unintentional injuries. That review sparked the idea proposed for her current grant, "Children's Peer Relations and the Risk for Injury."

The Peterson Homer Grant is made possible by a gift from Dr. Donald K. and Mrs. Marion W. Routh to the American Psychological Foundation and is administered by APA Division 54 (The Society of Pediatric Research).

Moser Wins Husted Award for Serious Mental Illness Research

APF is pleased to announce the winner of the 2005 Todd E. Husted Memorial Dissertation Award: **Lorna Moser**, a doctoral candidate in clinical rehabilitation psychology at Indiana University Purdue University Indianapolis (IUPUI). The \$1,000 award recognizes outstanding dissertation research demonstrating strong potential to improve mental health services for those with severe mental illnesses. The award is made possible through a gift from June Husted, Ph.D., whose son, Todd, died as a result of severe mental illness.

For her dissertation, Moser is developing and pilot-testing novel instruments to assess the employment of coercive interventions, e.g. assertiveness of treatment providers, by teams modeling the assertive community treatment (ACT) program, a team treatment approach designed to provide comprehensive, community-based psychiatric treatment, rehabilitation, and support to persons with serious and persistent mental illness such as schizophrenia.

Moser's research interests were prompted by her clinical experience working as an ACT case manager and research experience working as an implementation monitor for both the ACT Center of Indiana and the National Implementing Evidence-Based Practices Project, which is coordinated by New Hampshire-Dartmouth Psychiatric Research Center.

ERIC SCHOPLER, PH.D.

APPLICATION AWARD

Eric Schopler, Ph.D.

Dr. Eric Schopler revolutionized treatment for children and adults with autism through an extraordinary career. After joining the faculty of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1964, he reinterpreted the psychodynamic theories of parent blaming with parent professional collaboration and providing their children with the best possible educational opportunities. Schopler initiated the TEACCH Program's humane, innovative approach to autism at a time when the field was quite primitive and his work has influenced autism treatment worldwide. In addition, his scholarly activities have enriched the field and disseminated his forward thinking ideas to programs everywhere.

PUBLIC INTEREST AWARD

Asher R. Pacht, Ph.D.

Dr. Asher Pacht has had a significant impact on the quality of psychological services provided to the public through his decades of research and treatment of sex offenders, his vision and initiative in developing training standards and models for treatment of mentally ill correctional clients, his mentoring of young professionals in public service, his leadership and service in numerous and varied professional organizations, and his commitment to the regulation and licensing of psychologists with an emphasis on public protection. A gentleman, scholar, humanitarian, colleague, teacher, mentor, gifted clinician, and visionary, Pacht has devoted his career to serving the profession and the public.



JACK G. WIGGINS, JR., PH.D.

PRACTICE AWARD

Jack G. Wiggins, Jr., Ph.D.

For a lifetime of distinguished and celebrated contributions to the practice of psychology. **Dr. Jack Wiggins** has made a career in pioneering the elimination of inequities and deficiencies in the health care system. He won greater access to needed mental care by securing reimbursement for psychological treatments, thus, allowing development of community-based psychological therapies and creating new practice opportunities, especially for women and minorities. Via expert mentorship of countless others and his own actions, Wiggins has forever improved the practice of psychology. Today, he advocates eliminating current inequities in public access to mental treatments through gaining prescriptive authority for psychologists.



ALBERT BANDURA, PH.D.

SCIENCE AWARD

Albert Bandura, Ph.D.

Dr. Albert Bandura is an extraordinarily innovative scholar whose pioneering work in social cognitive theory has served as a rich resource for academics, practitioners, and policy makers alike across disciplinary lines. His illustrative career includes groundbreaking work across a broad range of areas. His seminal research on social modeling expanded our view of human learning and the growing primacy of this mode of learning in this electronic era. His later research on self-regulatory mechanisms laid the theoretical foundation for his theory of human agency. These diverse programs of research blend his theoretical interests with an abiding concern for the use of our knowledge for human enlightenment and betterment.

APF Promotes Healthy Organizations and Outstanding Teaching



DR. MICHAEL BEER

Dr. Michael Beer, the Cahners-Rabb professor of business administration emeritus at the Harvard Business School, has been awarded the 2006 APF Harry and Miriam Levinson Award for Exceptional Contributions to Consulting Organizational Psychology. The \$5,000 Levinson Award is presented annually to an APA member who has demonstrated extraordinary ability to integrate psychological theories and concepts into practical applications that are used by leaders and managers to create effective, healthy, and humane organizations.

Beer earned his Ph.D. in organizational psychology from Ohio State University. He is the co-founder and chairman of *TruePoint*, a research based consultancy. Prior to joining the Harvard faculty, Beer was director of organization research and development at Corning, Inc. His research and writings focus on organizational effectiveness and change and human resource management. Dr. Beer has authored or co-authored nine books as well as numerous articles and book chapters. He has received several awards for his professional contributions and is a fellow of the Society of Industrial & Organizational Psychology and the Academy of Management.

APF will honor **Randolph A. Smith, Ph.D.**, with its 2006 Charles L. Brewer Distinguished Teaching of Psychology Award at the APA/APF Awards Ceremony on Friday, Aug. 11, during APA's 2006 Annual Convention in New Orleans.

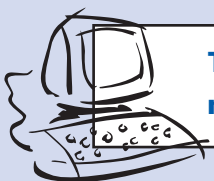


RANDOLPH A. SMITH, PH.D.

Smith was born in Corsicana, Texas in 1951. In the summer of 1973, Smith entered Texas Tech University's graduate psychology program, where he studied human learning and memory. In the summer of 1977, Smith began teaching at Ouachita Baptist University in Arkansas. In the 1980s, Smith became involved with APA's Division 2 (Society for the Teaching of Psychology) and served terms as membership chair, program chair and fellows chair. He also was involved in the Southwestern Psychological Association, serving as membership chair, program chair and executive council representative. He was elected SWPA president in 1990.

Smith's ongoing collaboration with Charles L. Brewer, Ph.D., motivated him to apply for the editorship of *Teaching of Psychology*. Smith was chosen to fill that position and has served as editor of the journal since 1997 (his second term will end in 2008). As editor, Smith has focused on promoting the scholarship of teaching through a more rigorous assessment of student learning. Smith also worked as co-founder and co-organizer of the Southwest Conference for Teachers of Psychology, established in 1991. In 2003, Smith left OBU to become department chair at Kennesaw State University. During Smith's tenure as chair, the department has grown from about 500 to 800 majors and from nine tenure-track faculty to 18.

Smith will deliver his Distinguished Teaching of Psychology Award Address, *Lessons Learned: Getting by with a Little Help from my Friends*, on Friday, Aug. 11, at 11am.
